

A MESSAGE FROM **DON B. TAGGART, CHAIRMAN,** & **AMBASSADOR (RET.) THOMAS J. MILLER, PRESIDENT & CEO OF IESC**

Starting Up and Gaining Momentum

IESC has come a long way since David Rockefeller, Sol Linowitz, and other Fortune 500 executives conceived of the idea of sending senior business volunteers to the developing world to share expertise and advice. It was no coincidence that IESC was modeled on President Kennedy's vision of a "Peace Corps," which had started less than two years before. We got off to an auspicious start when President Johnson announced the creation of IESC at a ceremony in the White House Rose Garden on June 15, 1964. In the 50 years that followed, we conducted over 25,000 individual volunteer missions in over 130 countries. We are proud to have created or saved over 1.5 million jobs for the enterprises we supported and the economies in which they work.

Responding to Change

As conditions around the world have changed, IESC has evolved to meet the challenges. In the 1960s, we did a great deal of work in Latin America, helping many of those countries transition from dictatorships to market-based democracies. In the 70s, our work in Asia helped foster an environment that led to the rise of the Asian Tigers and their economic miracles. In the 80s, our work in Africa helped unlock much of the potential of that continent. And in the 90s, we were at the forefront of helping countries in Central and Eastern Europe move towards market-based economies.

Identifying New Challenges

By the mid-90s, acknowledging that the problems of instability and conflict were on the rise, we adjusted our attention to longer-term projects in countries scarred by war and other major dislocations. We focused on economic development, including trade and enterprise, financial services, tourism, ICT and applied technologies, as well as business enabling environments.

We are extremely pleased that you are able to join us in celebration of the International Executive Service Corps' 50th Anniversary.

Today, our work in building the capacity of the Ministry of Agriculture in Afghanistan as well as promoting private sector development in Afghanistan has won widespread praise. Similarly, we are very proud of the work we are doing in Lebanon and Liberia to deepen the financial service networks in those countries. Our work with the governments of Kazakhstan and Ethiopia has gone a long way in developing the trade relationships those countries now enjoy. And the list goes on. With many of these projects, we are grateful to USAID, other U.S. Government Agencies, the World Bank and sovereign nations for their generous support of these projects.

We are pleased to report that IESC is financially very healthy. We have increased our revenues over six times in the last four years. Our staff has tripled in this period. Most importantly, as a testament to the quality of our work, we have received extensions on nearly all of our projects.

Reaching Beyond

Now is not the time to rest on our laurels or accomplishments. As we look to the future, we have embarked on an exciting partnership, in collaboration with AARP, with the Government of China to supply what could be hundreds, if not thousands, of volunteers to help the Chinese transition to a market-based economy. Furthermore, we are reaching well beyond governmental entities to form linkages with private enterprises and financial service organizations as we explore ways to broaden and enhance the achievement of our mission.

We're excited about these opportunities and look forward to exploring them as we move into our next 50 years.



FROM OUR EARLY YEARS

“I had in mind what might be called a Managerial Task Force of Free Enterprise, composed of volunteers on leave of absence from their companies or business associations. I saw them serving as either part of a unit or as individuals responding to invitations to bring their particular managerial skills to bear on projects deemed essential to the economic development of host nations.”

At the midpoint of its first five years, IESC was hailed for its accomplishments by the Lyndon Johnson administration. A second Rose Garden event took place — a reception for representative IESC staff members, directors, volunteers and country directors. President Johnson called IESC an inspiring example of government and private enterprise cooperation that could help preserve the free world.

Months later, PRAVDA, the Soviet news service, protested that IESC was nothing more than a new American instrument for the enslavement of underdeveloped countries.




